

Divine Service

Invocation

The sign of the cross may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism

It is in the Sacrament that God gives us His undeserved love. We begin the Divine Service with a remembrance of that moment when God gave to us all the blessing of Jesus life, death, and resurrection. We may gather before God in hope because of what God has done for us.

P In the name of the Father and of the

→ Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C Amen.

Christians are not perfect people. We are forgiven people. Here we again seek to lay our sins at the cross of Jesus and hear the Words of God that give forgiveness and peace.

Confession and Absolution

- P Beloved in the Lord! Let us draw near with a true heart and confess our sins unto God our Father, beseeching Him in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to grant us forgiveness.
- P Our help is in the name of the Lord,
- C who made heaven and earth.
- P I said, I will confess my transgressions unto the Lord,
- and You forgave the iniquity of my sin.

Silence for reflection on God's Word and for self-examination.

- P O almighty God, merciful Father,
- I, a poor, miserable sinner, confess unto You all my sins and iniquities with which I have ever offended You and justly deserved Your temporal and eternal punishment. But I am heartily sorry for them and sincerely repent of them, and I pray You of Your boundless mercy and for the sake of the holy, innocent, bitter sufferings and death of Your beloved Son, Jesus Christ, to be gracious and merciful to me, a poor, sinful being.

The pastor speaks the absolution not because he is holier than the people of the congregation. He does so because the congregation has appointed him to the office of the public ministry. His is to speak to the people God's Word as He has revealed it in Scripture.

- P Upon this your confession, I, by virtue of my office, as a called and ordained servant of the Word, announce the grace of God unto all of you, and in the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the

 → Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C Amen.

The Divine Service is divided into two parts. The first is the Service of the Word. And the second is the Service of the Sacrament. We will not have the Service of the Sacrament today. In the Service of the Word, we focus on the Bible, which is God speaking to us today. Through His Word, our faith grows because He is active in His Word.

Introit means to enter. After the confession of sins and the hearing of God's forgiveness with his people, the pastor enters the railing that separates the Altar from the rest of the Church. Through God's forgiveness and love we can come directly into God's presence without fear.

Having entered the Altar area we greet our King, Jesus. The Kyrie was a common greeting when meeting a King and asking for his blessing.



The Hymn of Praise is a song we offer to God in thanksgiving and worship for the forgiveness and compassion shown to us. Hymns (songs) in the Lutheran Church were written also to teach the faith and to remind believers of God's Word.

In "This is the Feast" we praise God for His invitation to us to join the eternal Feast.

The hymn also tells how the invitation is possible through Christ.

This Is the Feast



The Salutation is the greeting of disciples to one another. In the first century church, this was how believers said "hello."

The Collect of the Day is a prayer that sums up the needs of the people of God for that Sunday. It is a "collection" of the thoughts for the day.

O Lord, graciously hear the prayers of Your people that we who justly suffer the consequence of our sin may be mercifully delivered by Your goodness to the glory of Your name; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Sit

Our Divine Service typically has three readings from the Bible. One is from the Old Testament (written before the Birth of Jesus), one from an Epistle (epistle means letter. These are letters written by the Apostles to the early congregation), and one from a Gospel (Gospels are the written account of Jesus life and work). The Bible is how God speaks to His people today. The Scriptures are of divine origin and inerrant. God speaks through them now to instruct, bless, and comfort His people.

Old Testament Reading

Jeremiah 17:5-8

⁵Thus says the LORD:

"Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength, whose heart turns away from the LORD.

⁶He is like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see any good come.

He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land.

⁷"Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD.

whose trust is the LORD.

⁸He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream,

and does not fear when heat comes,

Epistle 1 Corinthians 15:1-20

¹Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, ²and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain.

³For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁴that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁵and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. ⁷Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. ⁸Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. ⁹For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. ¹⁰But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. ¹¹Whether then it was I or they, so we preach and so you believed.

¹²Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁴And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. ¹⁵We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. ¹⁶For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁷And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. ¹⁸Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. ¹⁹If in this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

²⁰But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep.



Holy Gospel Luke 6:17-26

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the sixth chapter.

G Glory to You, O Lord.

¹⁷[Jesus] came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea and Jerusalem and the seacoast of Tyre and Sidon, ¹⁸who came to hear him and to be healed of their diseases. And those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. ¹⁹And all the crowd sought to touch him, for power came out from him and healed them all.

²⁰And he lifted up his eyes on his disciples, and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God.

²¹ Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you shall be satisfied.

"Blessed are you who weep now, for you shall laugh.

²²"Blessed are you when people hate you and when they exclude you and revile you and spurn your name as evil, on account of the Son of Man! ²³Rejoice in that day, and leap for joy, for behold, your reward is great in heaven; for so their fathers did to the prophets.

²⁴ But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation.

- **P** This is the Gospel of the Lord.

The Apostle's Creed was not written by the apostles themselves. It is a summary of the teaching of the apostles. This creed served as the first "textbook" on teaching the Christian faith to new Christians and to children being raised in the faith.

Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord,
who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,
born of the virgin Mary,
suffered under Pontius Pilate,
was crucified, died and was buried.
He descended into hell.
The third day He rose again from the dead.
He ascended into heaven
and sits at the right hand of God the Father Almighty.
From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life

→ everlasting. Amen.

The Hymn of the Day is chosen by the preacher to give additional insight to the message he will deliver. Note again how the song teaches faith.


Offering

Cause us, by Your Holy Spirit, to bear much fruit and, when affliction and persecution come, to stand firm and rejoice at the great reward that is laid up for those who trust in You; through the same Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the same Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Immanuel <u>is</u> taking a significant step to establish a new source of income in support of our current ministry. At the special Voters Assembly Meeting held on 11/24/24, the congregation approved an Agreement with the Lutheran Church Extension Fund to explore using vacant space and land to create a new source of revenue for the congregation. This process begins with a market analysis to determine the highest and best use of land and building and potential customers for that space.

There will be a Town Hall Meeting on Tuesday, February 25 at 6 PM to which all members and friends are invited to attend. Mr. Tom Campbell (LCEF Senior Vice President), Mr. Kirk Hymes (LCEF Southeastern District Vice President) and Mr. Jonathan Ward (Project Leader) will be with us to provide information on the process that lies ahead and to answer your questions.
