October 6 Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost
Genesis 2:18–25 The Lord God creates woman.

Psalm 128 "Thus shall the man be blessed who fears the Lord."

Hebrews 2:1–13 (14–18) The one who makes men holy and those who are made holy are of the same family.

Mark 10:2–16 A question regarding divorce. "Let the little children come to Me."

The Lord bestows favor on man. He is to possess dominion over every living creature and is given woman to be his most blessed companion. Marriage between a husband and his wife is meant to prevail through life's circumstances. Yet adultery and divorce diminish this blessed institution. As we live in this constant tension, it is difficult to keep our sight focused on Jesus. Sin rears its deception and we are enticed to unbelief. Mark 10:23–31 "All things are possible with God."

Ministry Notes

A Healthy Body. A Healthy Immanuel.

A Healthy Body, A Healthy Immanuel is our theme for October as we work toward prayerfully making our financial, time, and talent vows to the Lord. Below is a brief Bible study about the Church as the Body of Christ and what it means to be a spiritually healthy congregation.

1 Corinthians 12:12-13 (ESV) 12 For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. 13 For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit.1 Corinthians 12:27 (ESV) 27 Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.

Through our baptism, we participate in the body of Jesus. His righteousness becomes ours. His suffering on the cross becomes ours. His death becomes ours. His resurrection becomes ours. Through the Holy Spirit, we become the body of Christ in the world.

We are the eyes, hands, feet, ears, mouth, etc. of Jesus through whom He works. It is God's will to work through us to carry on His mission of bringing the Gospel of Jesus Christ to all people for their salvation. We do this willingly and with great joy in thanksgiving for the love and grace given to us by Jesus.

In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul compares our physical bodies to us as the body of Christ. Each of us is an important and needed member of this body. Like the members of our physical body when each member is doing its part in the body, the body of healthy. When any member is not functioning properly the body is unhealthy and all the members are affected. Paul says in Ephesians 4:15 ESV "Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, 16 from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working

properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love."

In a healthy body of Christ (you and I as a congregation) there are 5 main parts which we have been referring to as "5-fold functions." These are Worship, Education, Fellowship, Service, and Evangelism. On a macro scale, for the body of Christ at Immanuel to be healthy, all 5 functions need to be present and fulfilling their purpose. The lack of any of these produces illness in the rest of the body. On a micro scale, all of these functions need to be present in the life of a disciple for a healthy spiritual life. A lack of anyone brings spiritual illness to the disciple.

In Building on Christ-Equipping for the Future, our aim is to restore the health of Immanuel as the body of Christ and work to keep the disciple and the congregation spiritual healthy as we gather around word and Sacrament and live as the body of Christ. This is our healthy response to the mercy, grace, and salvation given to us by Jesus through His life, death, and resurrection. As Paul says in Romans 12:1 I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. 2 Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

Part of our "living sacrifice" involves properly stewarding the gifts God gives us in time, talents/skills, and treasure. These are all entrusted to us by God for use as disciples serving in the body of Christ and as the body of Christ. This is how a disciple lives their life and how the body of Jesus lives in the world.

On the macro scales time relates to all a disciple's life from baptism to grave. The goal of a disciple's life is to live as usefully as possible to our God in worship and thanksgiving. Talent refers to the use of all that we are as a child of God in worship and thanksgiving. Treasure refers to all the material things God entrusts to us to use in worship and thanksgiving to Him. All three are used by the disciple as part of the body of Christ, Immanuel Congregation.

Beginning October 6th, we will examine the spiritual health of the individual disciple and the health of Immanuel in light of the fivefold function of the Church. We will begin with Worship (The Divine Service) where we gather as the Body of Christ around His Means of Grace, Word and Sacrament.

On October 13th, we will look at Education. This involves coming to know God better where He reveals Himself to us in His Word. Can you recognize the voice of God? On this Sunday, you will be encouraged to make a vow of the use of Time to our Lord.

On October 20th, we will look at the dual functions of Fellowship and Service. How is the love of God manifested among us and in the world around us. On this Sunday, you will be encouraged to make a vow of talents and abilities in serve to our Lord.

Finally, October 27th, Reformation Sunday, we will examine the function of Evangelism. In this the Body of Christ (Immanuel; you and me) walks in the world as Jesus bringing the good news of salvation through the cross. On this Sunday we will make our financial pledges to the work of God at Immanuel.

<u>B</u>uilding on <u>C</u>hrist, <u>E</u>quipping for the <u>F</u>uture Update as of October 1, 2024

Twelve BCEF Teams have been formed to provide a new focus on the challenges that Immanuel is facing and the realization that changes are necessary if we are to continue in ministry. A total of 36 members or friends of Immanuel have come together to form the twelve teams listed below.

There is some significant planning taking place when you consider that most, if not all of the BCEF teams are quite active. It is our plan to provide three short verbal reports of one minute or less each Sunday during the announcements with one report coming from finance, one from spirituality, and one from projects. In addition, periodic written reports will appear in the Herald.

By now, you have probably received the letter from the Stewardship Team and the Insert that details the current financial challenges that we face. At first glance, Immanuel's financial future may appear hopeless. However, everyone on the BCEF Leadership Team would not agree with this. In addition to your generous financial support, the twelve BCEF Teams have begun the work to identify and implement new sources of income in support of our existing ministry and to make new ministry possible. BCEF Team 1 is working to engage a commercial real estate developer to determine "best practices /uses" for our property and building with the goal of establishing a for profit entity that would be capable of generating new sources of funds in support of our ministry.

In this light, the church has received a proposal from the Lutheran Church Extension Fund to help us identify the highest and best use of the existing 2.73-acre campus excluding the sanctuary, fellowship hall/kitchen, church office, two classrooms and associated parking to accommodate the same. The study would focus on the following:

- Vacant Land: Complete a preliminary market analysis of the undeveloped land (~1.10 acres) examining various uses for ILC to create an alternative source of revenue and possibility grow its ministry. This will identify the highest and best use of the site.
- Provide a preliminary land value estimate.
- Former school classrooms and office space (north wing): Review building characteristics and feasibility of repurpose for leasing to a third party. This will include a market analysis to measure potential interest in today's market climate.
- Provide high level insights on the possibility of removing the structure (the north wing) to make way for a possible new building to accommodate a future use to create an alternative source of revenue.
- Preliminary site analysis identifying potential density, site characteristics, zoning, setbacks and other site factors.
- Initial discussion with Baltimore City to ascertain interest and feasibility.
- Work with the congregational key stake holders to identify ILC's current and future worshiping and ministry needs to identify building size and site amenities to accommodate contemplated future uses.

It is our prayer that a new sources of funds for ministry will be identified. Significant detail has been provided as an example of the scope of the efforts taking place to revitalize ministry at Immanuel. In future monthly editions, work underway within other teams will be highlighted as all 12 Teams work to provide the infrastructure in support ministry renewal at Immanuel.
