LETTER FROM PASTOR MINETREE

Psalm 46:8-11 (ESV) ⁸Come, behold the works of the LORD, how he has brought desolations on the earth. ⁹He makes wars cease to the end of the earth; he breaks the bow and shatters the spear; he burns the chariots with fire. ¹⁰"Be still, and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth!" ¹¹The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. Approximately 34 year ago I sat in the student commons of Concordia Seminary. The temperature in St. Louis was in the high nineties and the humidity was just as bad. I was gazing into my Hebrew language textbook as sweat dripped into it off of my nose. I was praying. I felt I have made a big mistake. The class was difficult and I doubted my ability to pass. I had married only a month before and dragged my new wife and step son half way across the country in a venture that seemed doomed. I prayed for God's mercy, forgiveness, and guidance. His answer wasn't to take me from the difficult situation but to bring me through it. This was a tremendous lesson to learn for a would be pastor. He who did not spare His own son was certainly God over all things too. He led me through Hebrew that summer and the other 4 years of seminary. Holding my hand tightly in His, He brought me to my first call, parish and people. He has held me through mountain tops and valleys. When my anxiety mounted He whispered, Be still, Chuck, and know that I am God. When I was in a deep valley and begged to be removed from it, He would whisper, my grace is sufficient for you, and bring me through. When I stood on mountain tops I did not forget that I was there only by the grace of God. As I reflect on 56 years of life and 30 years in the office of the public ministry the overriding theme is God's Grace. It is His undeserved love. It is His hand around mine as He leads me. The Apostle John refers to Himself in His gospel as the only who Jesus loved. This was not a boast. It was a humble confession. The word for love used there means to love someone despite who and what they are. It means to see all their faults and sins and still love them dearly. This is how John felt about Christ's love. I certainly echo that feeling.

I share this as part of my thank you for the celebration you gave my family and me for my 30th anniversary of ordination. That this milestone was remembered and you celebrated with me means more than I can express in words. It is a mountain top experience. It is one I feel in no way deserving. It is all God's grace. It is His undeserved love. I want you to know my thanks and appreciation. I want all glory and praise to go to our Lord Jesus Christ. Again I hear Him say, be still and know that I am God.

CELEBRATING THE 500 ANNIVERSARY OF THE LUTHERAN REFORMATION!

For the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, I have several special items planned. IT'S A COMPLICATED STORY OF MONEY AND POWER, AND JOHANN TETZEL PLAYED A BIG PART. Tetzel was a Dominican monk who specialized in preaching indulgences. Indulgences were pardons from the penalties of sin imparted by the Church. They originated as an inducement for men to fight in the Crusades. The business of selling indulgences expanded to raise money for other good purposes like building churches. Unscrupulous churchmen also used them to buy church offices.

Enter Albrecht, brother to the elector of Brandenburg. Although Albrecht was the archbishop of Magdeburg, he coveted the archbishopric of Mainz. But this appointment cost money, especially since the pope was building a new St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. The two churchmen made a deal. Tetzel would go into Albrecht's territories and raise funds through the sale of indulgences to meet both of these needs.

Tetzel may have started as the target of Luther's ire, but soon a clearer picture emerged wherein Tetzel was seen as a gréasy cog in a corrupt machine.
